Monuments of the Future?

Monuments are always under scrutiny: While Confederate monuments in the USA are being removed from public spaces - sometimes by force - activists in Germany are campaigning for the renaming of streets currently dedicated to personalities who were involved in colonial oppression.

New monuments, on the other hand, are to be erected to commemorate people and communities whose social achievements have received little recognition to date.

Commemorative culture touches on both political representation and daily life. What is remembered and what remains invisible is a matter of public interest.

The project "Monuments of the Future?" Explored and discussed the processes involved in the construction, dismantling or updating of monuments, which do not always take place under the eyes of the public.

As a result of the project a workshop toolkit was developed that serves partner institutions of the Goethe-Institut as a basis or supplement for conducting their own workshops on monuments and memory culture.

About the Toolkit

The toolkit supports young people in prototyping not only a memorial but also the process of creation itself. By observing the environment and approaching it through a variety of media, it enables critical reflection on memorial culture as well as the identification of gaps in the participants' immediate environment.


The workshop is designed to enrich the group with a perspective that focuses on collaborative creative processes and transdisciplinarity, and incorporates issues of historiography and the negotiation of dissent and consensus. By looking at existing monuments, participants engage with history and can add to it, change it, renew it, or determine a new position from their perspective.

Through exercises and assignments, some individual and some group, participants learn to work both independently and cooperatively. Moderation by the respective mediators and teachers from the partner institutions helps to find compromises and overcome creative blockades.

Participants pursue their own interests.

They may research and analyze, but also draw, design and build.

Toolkit Elements




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Workshop Structure

The structure of the workshop imitates a design process and is divided into three phases with different goals. Single Phases can also be used on their own.

Explore:

Corresponds to research.
Visit an existing monument and ask questions about it.



Discuss:

Find the meaning and purpose of your own monument or update an existing monument.

At the end, the group creates a briefing for their monument proposal.



Imagine:

With the help of different techniques and interventions, the participants develop their monument proposal and present it.

In each phase, the following three types of cards can be found:


Questions

that stimulate observations, initiate conversations, and guide through complex issues.



Case studies

and informative stories that give examples to questions



Actions

and small interventions that activate the participants and make the questions tangible.


CASE STUDY In the Nelson Mandela Park in <u>Bremen</u>, <u>Germany</u>, there is a large elephant made of brick. It was erected as an imperial colonial honorary monument in 1931 and was a symbol of German colonialism. In 1989, it was rededicated by adding a new bronze plaque, and the elephant became an anti-colonial monument—without any changes to the statue itself.
