Henrike Grohs Art Award 2024: Shortlist Announcement

The Goethe-Institut is excited to announce the 21 shortlisted candidates for the Henrike Grohs Art Award 2024. There were 690 applications received from 40 countries on the continent.

The Henrike Grohs Art Award is a biennial art prize conceived by the Goethe-Institut and the Grohs family in memory of the former Head of Goethe-Institut in Abidjan, Henrike Grohs. The prize is awarded biennially to an artist or arts collective living and working on the African continent, and practising in the field of visual arts.

Applications to the 4th Henrike Grohs Art Award closed on 31 August 2023. 690 applications were received from 40 countries on the continent.

The selection committee, made up of **Martha Kazungu** (curator, art historian and writer living and working between Nairobi and Kampala), **Edna Bettencourt** (Angolan curator, cultural agent, and producer) and **Jean Kamba** (writer, poet, independent researcher and art critic living and working in Kinshasa), selected the following 21 artists for the shortlist:

The main prize will be selected by an international jury with the announcement being made online in 2024. The winning artist will receive a cash prize of 20.000€ and 10.000€ towards a publication of their work. Two artists will be selected as runners up and will receive a cash prize of 5.000€ each.

Henrike Grohs studied ethnology and was Head of the Goethe-Institut in Abidjan from 2013–2016. She co-founded the project Next - Intercultural Projects at the Haus der Kulturen der Welt in Berlin. Between 2002 and 2009, she worked as Project Manager in the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra's Education programme. In 2009, she was appointed Advisor on Culture and Development at the Goethe-Institut in South Africa. Henrike Grohs passed away at the age of 51 in a terrorist attack in Côte d'Ivoire in March 2016 along with seventeen other people.
