

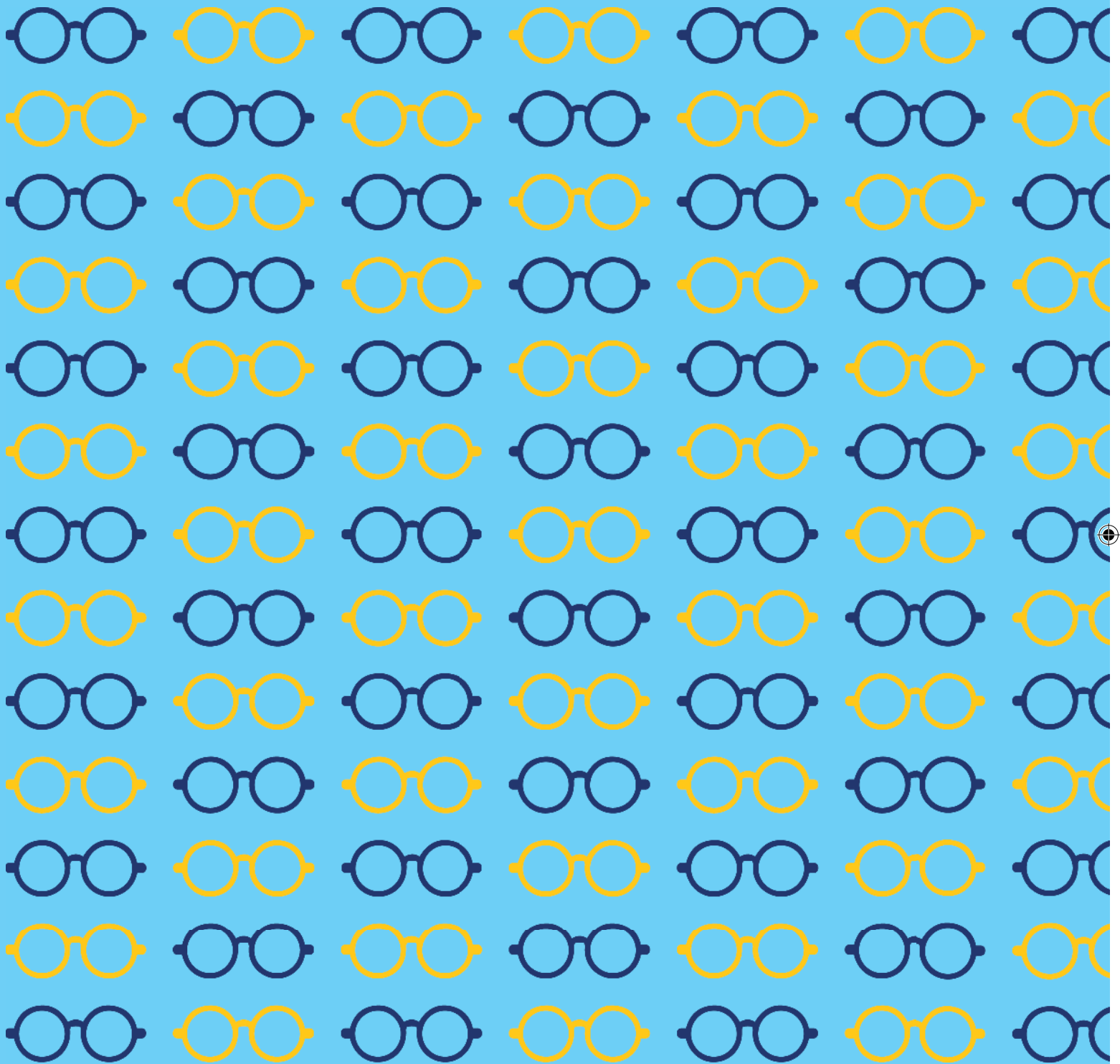


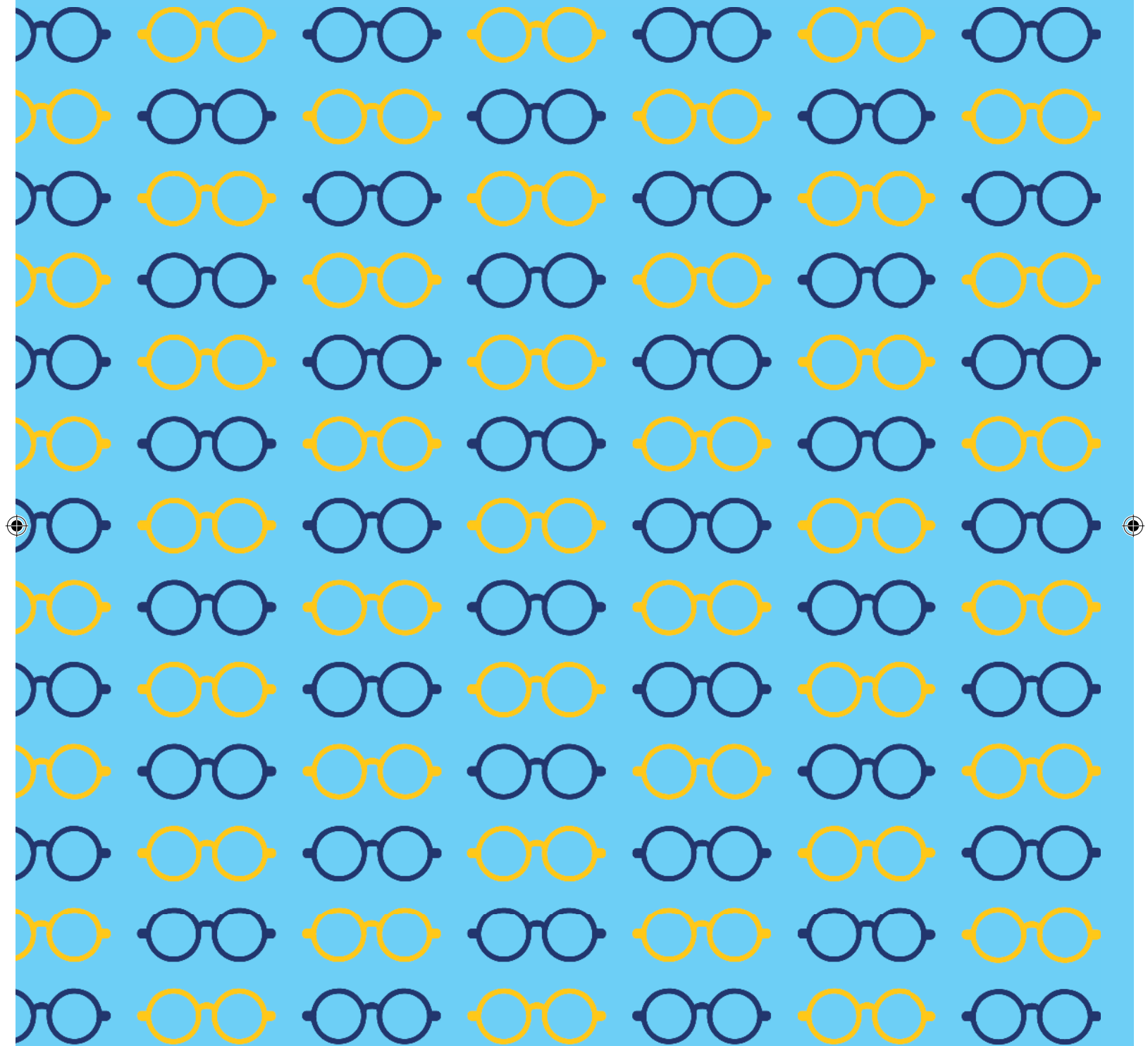

before you go.”**

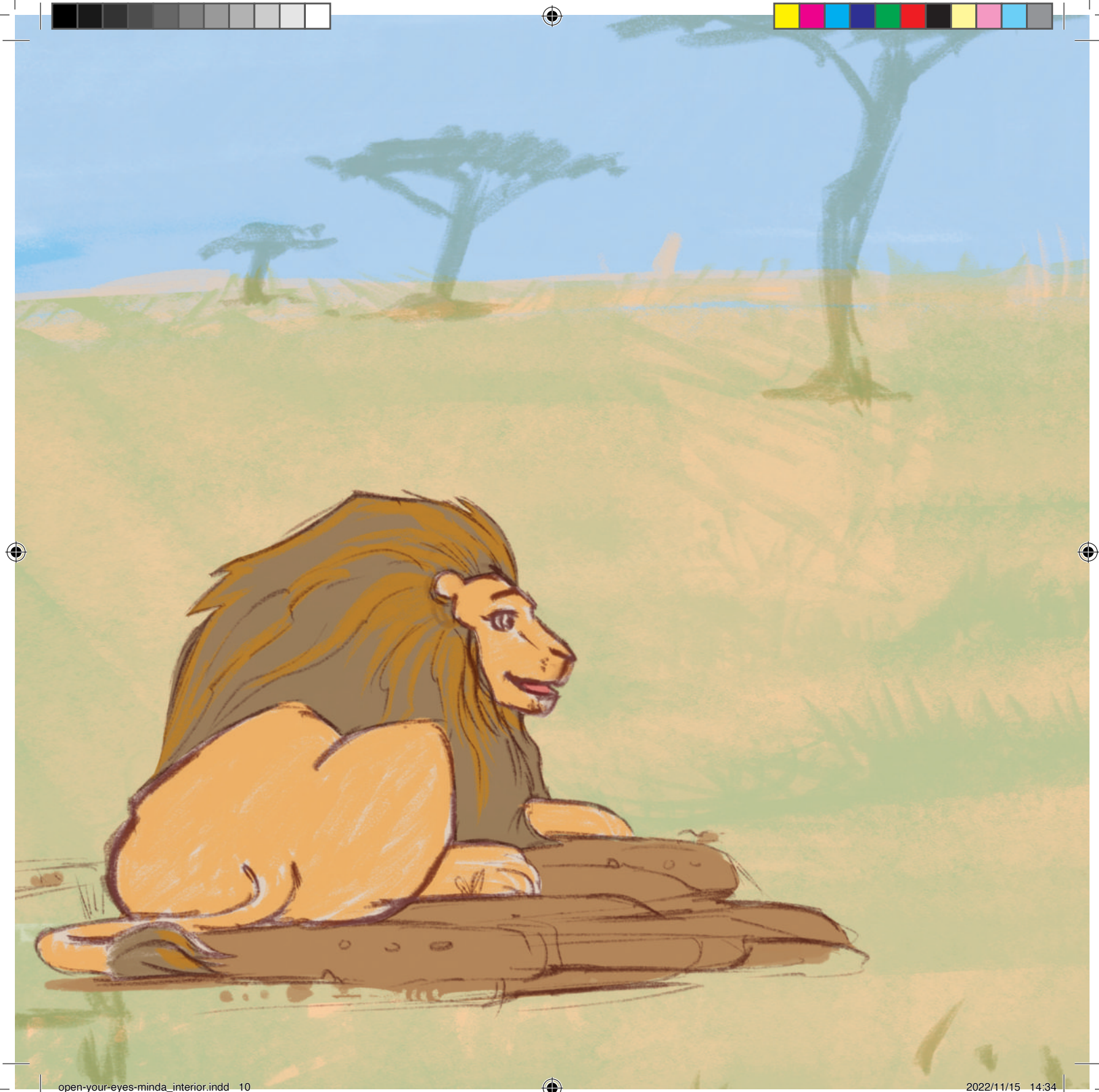


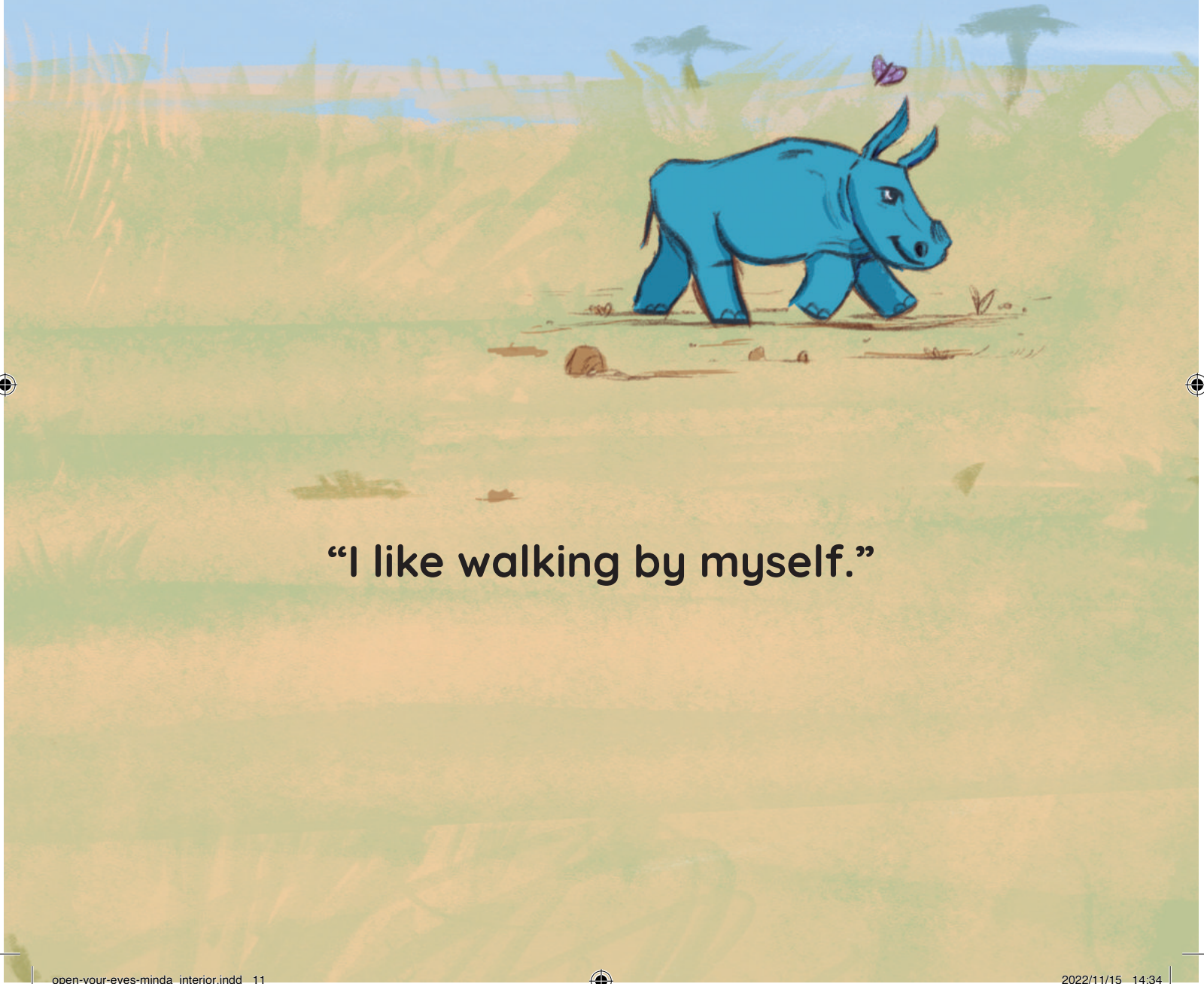




**“I don’t need glasses,” Minda

without them and I know my way.”**







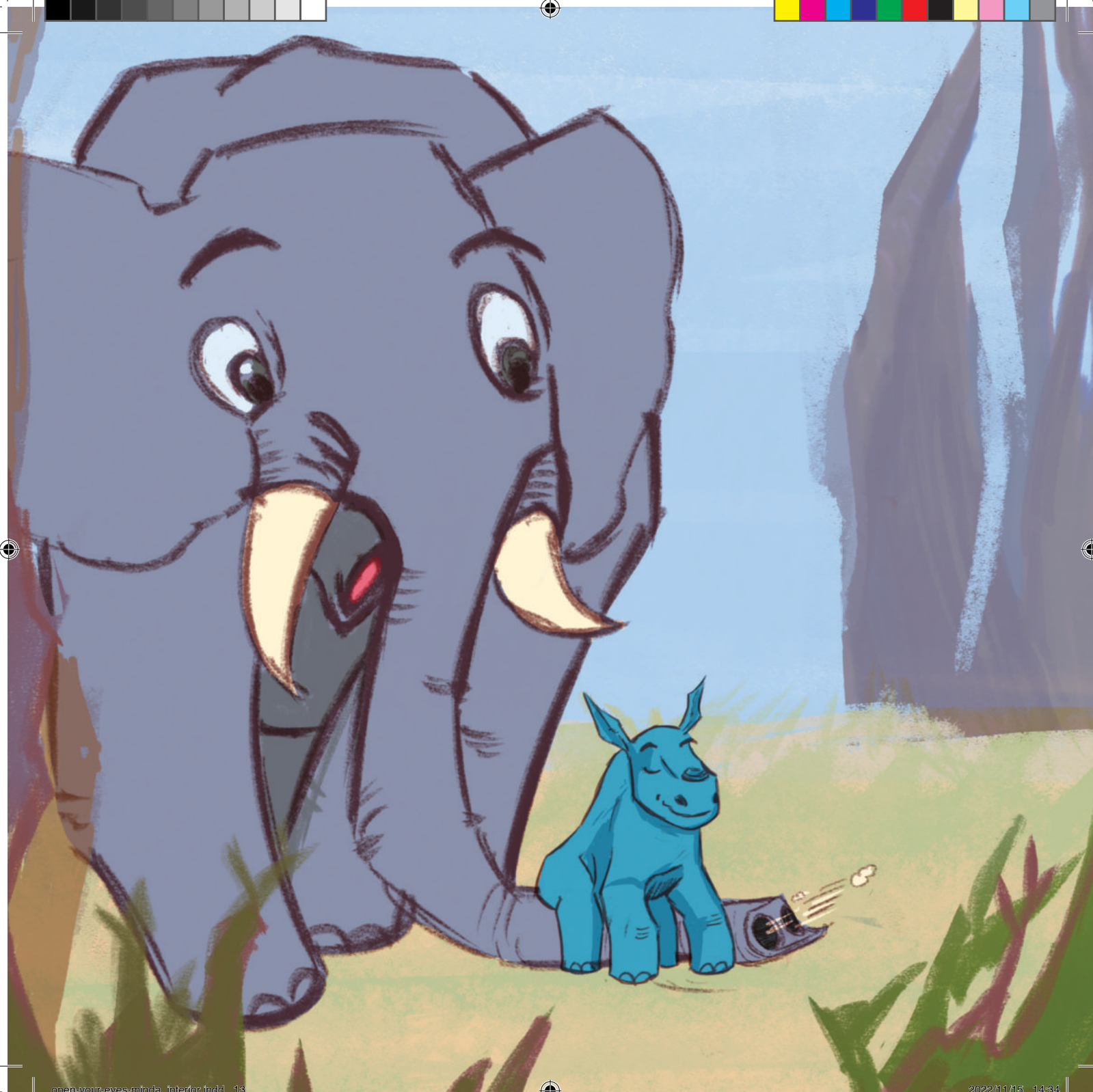
“I like walking by myself.”

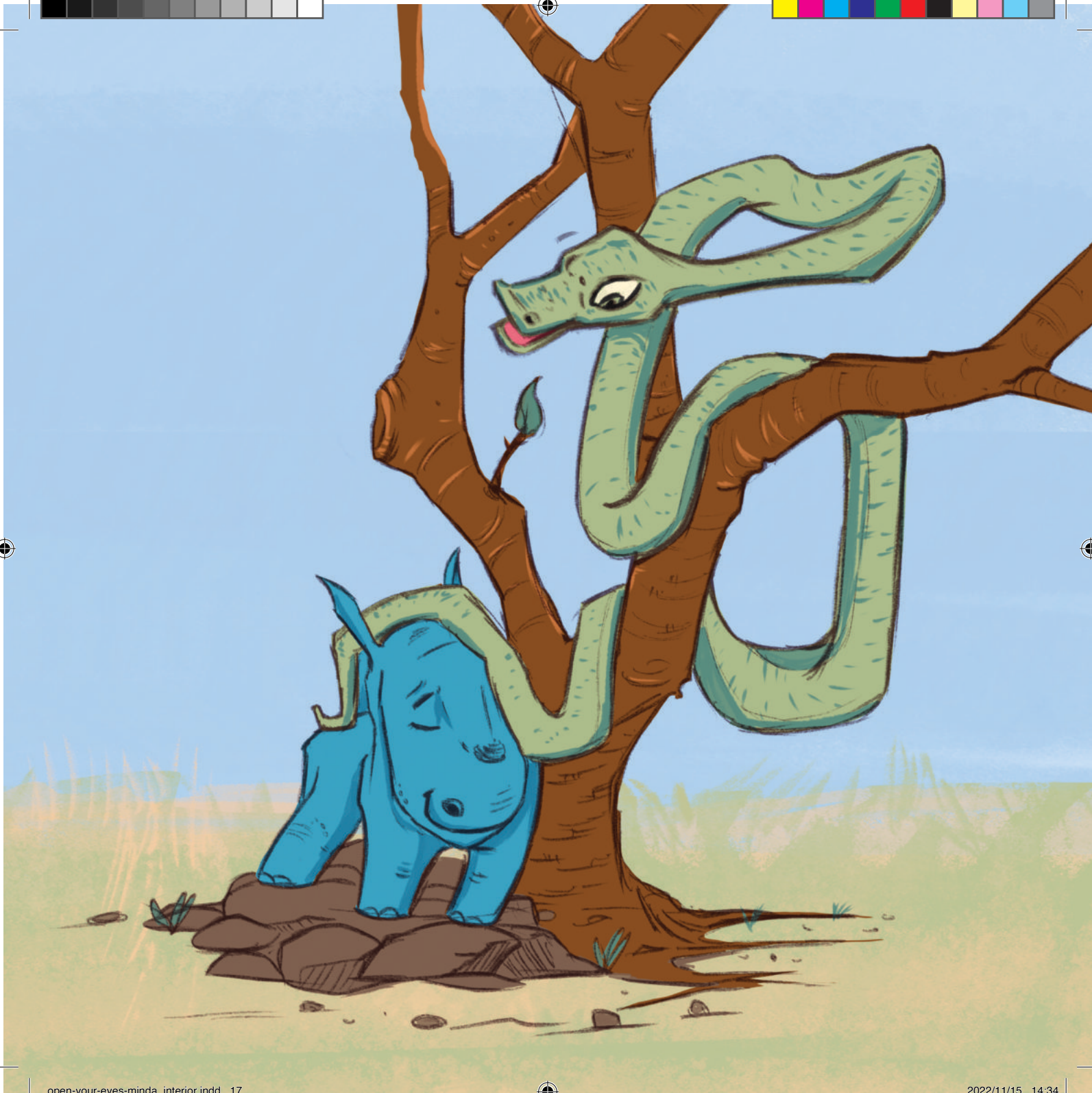

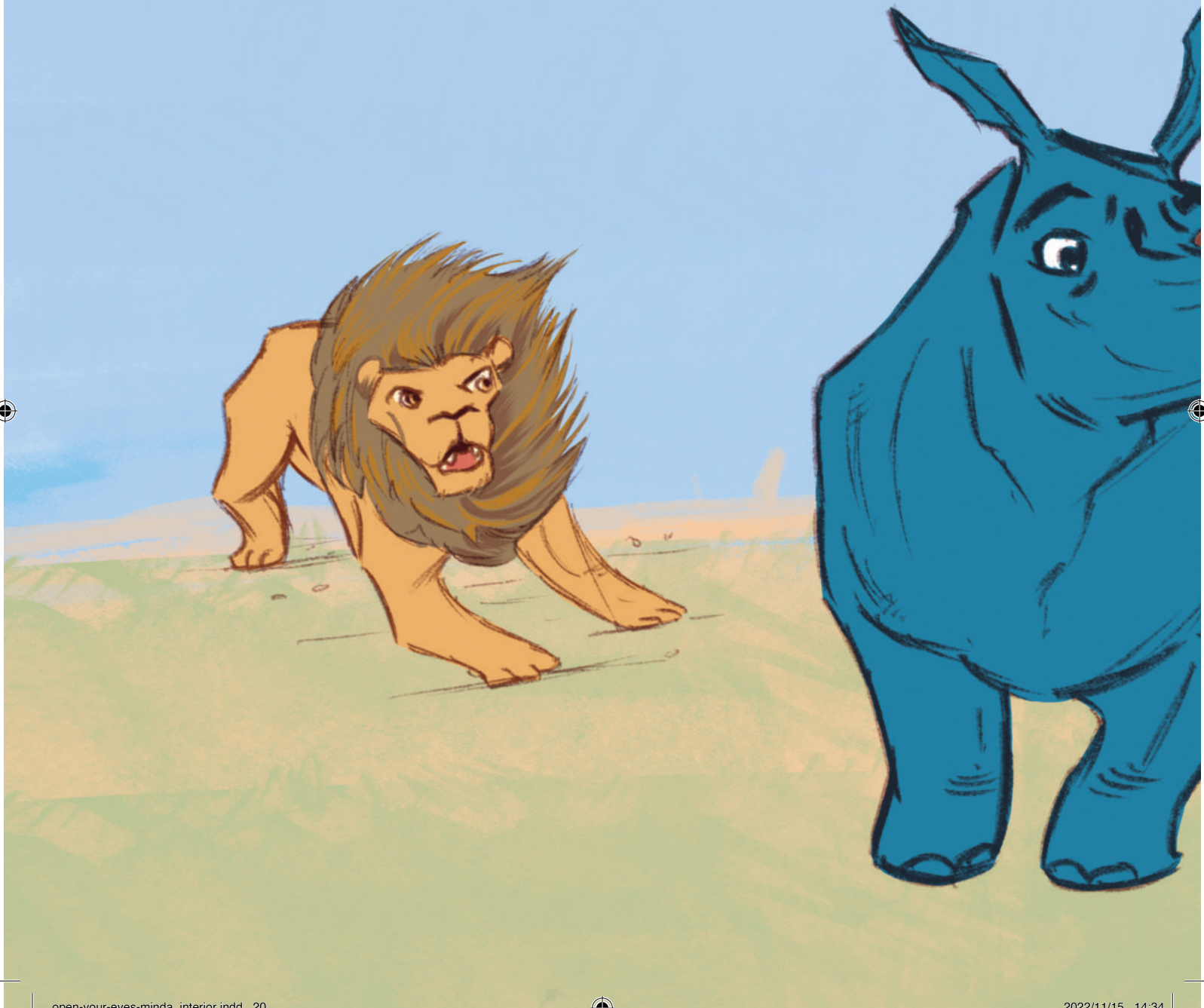

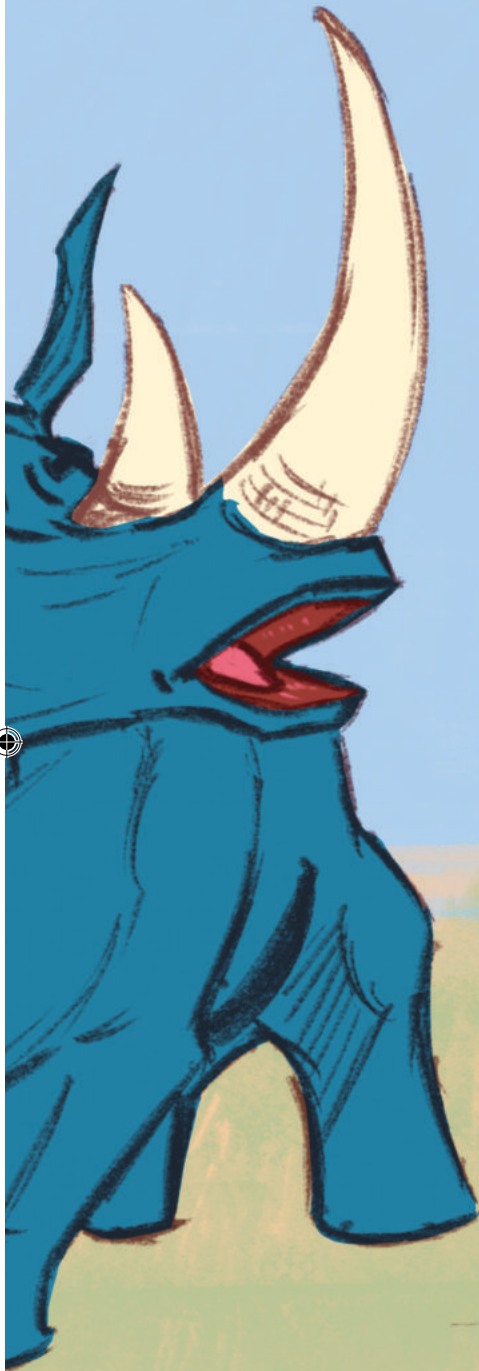








“Minda!” Mum shouts.
