INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the second instalment of Fokus: Films from Germany! Once again, we present a selection of titles that represent the diverse nature of filmmaking in Germany – both past and present. We were interested in selecting a wide array of topics and cinematic styles that shed light on current debates and discourses in Germany with the aim to encourage and inspire our audiences in Scotland to reflect on, relate to and maybe also differentiate themselves from them.

In our opening film *Hedi Schneider* is Stuck, the seemingly invincible protagonist Hedi, a quirky, carefree and creative woman, is brought to her knees by panic attacks that no coping mechanism can overcome. For her equally humorous and authentic portrayal of a woman who is literally afraid of fear. Laura Tonke won the German Film Prize LOLA for Best Leading Actress. We are delighted to welcome writer and director Sonja Heiss for our opening event. She will be in conversation with Richard Warden. curator of Scottish Mental Health Arts and Film Festival, who we are happy to collaborate with this year.

We are particularly thrilled to present four films by female directors. In addition to Hedi Schneider is Stuck, the films WILD by Nicolette Krebitz, 4 Kings by Theresa von Eltz and 24 Weeks by Anne Zohra Berrached show an impressive range of themes and aesthetics present in the works of female directors in Germany. While Krebitz tells a fantastic story of a young woman's relationship with a wild animal, von Eltz explores the relationship dynamics between a group of teenagers in a psychiatric emergency unit at Christmas, the supposedly most wonderful time of the year. In contrast, Anne Zohra Berrached focuses on the story of a woman who faces the difficult decision whether to have a late-term abortion when she learns that her child will have Down's syndrome as well as a serious heart defect.

The People vs. Fritz Bauer and We Are Young. We Are Strong both implicitly speak to the current debate around rising xenophobia and right-wing movements in Europe by taking a look at historical events in German history. While Lars Kraume's film deals with one man's battle to bring Nazi crimes

to light despite the collective denial of a nation, Burhan Qurbani's takes a look at the riots against asylum seekers in Rostock-Lichtenhagen in 1992. Both films inspire the audience to reflect on current debates and challenges that European countries face in the presence of rising nationalism.

The fascinating documentary From Caliaari to Hitler follows the development of cinema during the Weimar Republic up to the Nazi era and asks the question: Does cinema know something that we don't? Did it anticipate the political developments that followed on its heel? The film by Rüdiger Suchsland carefully assembles expressive scenes from iconic as well as lesser known films of the Weimar era, wetting the audience's appetite for more. With Robert Siodmak's experimental silent film People on Sunday and Fritz Lang's masterfully directed The Testament of Dr. Mabuse, we picked two very different films that show both ends of the artistic spectrum that Weimar cinema has to offer.

Uli, Hedi and Finn are a happy, loving family. They get by with various odd jobs, and Hedi particularly uses humour to deal with every unpleasant setback. Even when she gets stuck in the elevator, she seems to manage just fine. But when she begins to suffer from panic attacks, the everyday life of the family suddenly spirals out of control and everything that seemed to be certain is not anymore. Nothing will stay the same, and even when Hedi manages to overcome this crisis, both Hedi and Uli are aware that they have changed. Well-meant advice, hysterical parents, bored therapists and unfulfilled wishes – all these together create a tragicomedy about fear and the influence of love.

Jentsch delivers a raw and moving performance as she struggles to make her decision, with the added pressure that her celebrity implies that her ordeal is considered public property.

Rostock-Lichtenhagen, August 1992: unemployed youths struggle with their boredom and frustrations in a prefabricated housing development. At night, they run riot. fighting with the police and foreigners. The confrontations become so threatening that the authorities decide to evacuate the Romanian Roma from a refugee centre. As potential victims, the Vietnamese remain in the so-called "Sonnenblumenhaus" (sunflower house). The riots escalate, but the police retreat, and a night of violence ensues - before the eyes of a gaping and applauding crowd. The young filmmaker Burhan Qurbani reconstructs the notorious night that became a national disgrace.

However, there has been no success so far due to the fierce German determination to repress its sinister past. Influential people would like to see Fritz Bauer finally rendered "harmless". Denunciations, which even spill over into his private life, aspiring to establish his homosexuality and therefore a breach of Paragraph 175, threaten to wear him and his colleagues down.

Oh Boy is a self-deprecating portrait of a voung man and his city. It addresses the desire to participate in life and the difficulty in finding one's place. Niko is in his late 20s and recently dropped out of law school. He is drifting through the streets of Berlin, observing the people around him with curiosity as they manage their daily lives. oblivious to his own growing status as an outsider. One day everything changes, and Niko is forced to confront the consequences of his inaction. Its episode-like structure makes Oh Boy appear like a compilation of individual short films, yet each episode is connected with the rest. The director and author succeeds in compressing a cinematic "coming-of-age story" into the turbulent 24 hours in the life of a young man, at the end of which nothing will be as before.

The Weimar Republic (1918 to 1933), was the freest state on German soil: a wild era characterised by disruption, crisis, and cultural brilliance. It was also arguably the most important period of German cinema, a time full of wonders and invention. The aesthetic foundations were laid for the "seventh art"; Weimar's directors like Murnau, Lang, Lubitsch, Pabst, Wilder, Sternberg and Ruttmann are still legendary today, their stars Marlene Dietrich, Louise Brooks, Emil Jannings and Conrad Veidt are unforgotten, and films like Nosferatu, The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari, Metropolis, M; People on Sunday, Berlin: Symphony of a Great City, and The Blue Angel demonstrate their unique aura. This essential documentary gives an insight into these great films, and this turbulent time.

One of the earliest movies to renounce stars, drama and other paraphernalia of commercial cinema in favour of a non-professional cast and an unmomentous, everyday storyline. Most of it centres around a Sunday excursion from the bustle of Berlin to a countryside lake, where a bachelor and his married friend drift in and out of flirtations with two young women. Hardly anything happens, but the play of gazes, emotions and counterpoints becomes deeply engrossing. You end up not only learning a lot about life in 1929, but also realizing how little sexual mores have changed.

The film continues the tale of the first two parts of Dr. Mabuse, Der Spieler (Dr. Mabuse: The Gambler). The villain continues his demonic dealings in the lunatic asylum, where he has managed to hypnotize the asylum's director Dr. Baum, bringing him under his control. With Dr. Baum's assistance. he commands a band of unscrupulous gangsters. As though driven by the furies, Mabuse sits in his cell planning one violent act after another: assassinations, murders, arson, and counterfeit money. The Testament of Dr. Mabuse is often considered a decidedly anti-fascist film prophesying the crimes committed by the Nazis. The film is also an extremely clever and well thought-out genre product. This is characterized by Fritz Lang's masterly use of sound and voices (at a time when the sound film was still in its infancy) corresponding with the use of lighting cues.

For S4-S6, we have chosen *I Feel Like Disco*, an entertaining as well as sensitive film about a boy coming to terms with the loss of his mother while facing the challenge of discovering his sexuality and coming out to his father. We are particularly delighted to show this film in collaboration with SQIFF, Scottish Queer International Film Festival.

Fiddlesticks, a colourful film about a gang of kids that safe their grandparents from being relegated to a retirement home, is suitable for P4-S3.






